A simple summary of Acts

Acts is descriptive and not prescriptive; i.e.

- o <u>it describes what went on</u> in those 30 or so years following our Lord's death, resurrection and ascension.
- It does not prescribe what should be happening in Christianity today.


Acts is dominated by:


- o **the Jews** who were being offered a <u>second chance</u> to accept Jesus as the Son of God and their Messiah,
- o and **the Gentiles** of that time were brought in in an attempt to help and stimulate them to do just that.



The Book of Acts - two main sections



Acts 1 to 9 - concerning Jews only

- · Message that Jesus is the Christ
- Preached to Jews exclusively
- · Peter is main figure
- Outward signs verifying God's approval of those Jews who believed the message

Acts 10 to 28 – concerning Jews, then Gentiles


- Message of salvation through Christ
- Preached to Jews first, but also to Gentiles now
- Paul is main figure
- Outward signs verifying God's approval of those who believed the message – both Jew and Gentile (Jews still prior in God's dealings. Gentiles were accepted to provoke Israel to jealousy)

- Introduction (1:1-3)
- Christ's final instructions and ascension (1:4-14)
- The choosing of the twelfth apostle (1:15-26)
- Jewish feast of Pentecost, and events in Jerusalem (2:1-8:1)
- Jewish believers increase throughout Judea and Samaria (8:2-38)
- Conversion of Saul/Paul, and subsequent events (9:1-31)
- Further increase in Jewish believers throughout Judea (9:32-43)
- Gentiles accepted without becoming proselytes (10:1-11:18)
- Antioch becomes an prominent Christian centre (11:19-30)
- James killed, Peter's imprisonment, Herod's death (12:1-24)
- Paul's first journey of preaching, teaching and encouragement (12:25-14:27)
- The Council of Jerusalem (15:1-35)
- Paul's <u>second</u> journey of preaching, teaching and encouragement (15:36 18:22)
- Paul's third journey of preaching, teaching and encouragement (18:23-21:16)
- Paul's last days of freedom in Jerusalem (21:17-29)
- Paul's arrest/imprisonment (21:17-28:31) in Jerusalem; in Caesarea; the journey by ship to Rome; house arrest in Rome.











Nations mentioned in Acts 2:9-11





Paul's conversion and early travels – summary






Paul's conversion and early travels – detailed

- 35-38 AD, Paul is converted near Damascus & spends time in Arabia, the Nabatean kingdom that extends from Damascus to the Red Sea. (Gal. 1:17)
- 2. 38 AD, After a year or two, Paul returns to Damascus & preaches in synagogues. Paul escapes Damascus & leaves for Jerusalem.
- 3. 38 AD, Paul returns to Jerusalem after having been gone for 3 years. Paul spends fifteen days with Peter and meets James. (Gal.1:18-19) Paul debates the Grecian Jews and his life is threatened (Acts 9:29)
- 4. 38 AD, Paul is escapes Jerusalem and is taken to Caesarea to board a ship for his hometown of Tarsus in Cilicia. (Acts 9:30)
- 5. 38-43 AD, Paul preaches in Cilicia and Syria for five years. (Gal.1:20-23)
- 6. 43 AD, Barnabus leaves Antioch to search for Paul in Tarsus in order to bring him back to teach in the church of Antioch.
- 7. 44 AD, After one year of preaching in Antioch (Acts 11:26), Paul goes with Barnabus to Jerusalem with an offering from the Antioch church for the believers suffering from the famine. (Acts 11:29-30) While they are there James is killed by Herod Agrippa I, Peter escapes from prison and Herod Agrippa I dies in Caesarea. (Acts 12)
- 8. 45 AD, Barnabas and Saul return from Jerusalem to Antioch. John Mark comes with them (Acts 12:25)

Between the "first" and "second" journeys, Paul and Barnabas travel from Antioch to the Council of Jerusalem – Acts 15:1-4; and then return again to Antioch – Acts 15:30,35.

After the Council of Jerusalem, the "second" of the journeys begins.
